### **ABOUT CATHOLIC CHARITIES**

Established in 1954 as the primary social service arm of the Catholic Church in the Diocese of Greensburg and rooted in the Gospel and social teaching of the church, our mission is to serve the human needs of individuals and families, regardless of their religious affiliation, and to provide leadership in building collaborative efforts with parishes and communities in addressing these needs.

The organization's governance and management policies, practices, and procedures meet the highest ethical standards for nonprofits in Pennsylvania.

Our mission was undertaken shortly after the diocese was established in 1951. Bishop Hugh L. Lamb invited religious sisters from Philadelphia to the new diocese to assess its human social service needs.

With the support of Bishop Lamb's successors, Bishop William G. Connare, Bishop Anthony G. Bosco, and Bishop Lawrence E. Brandt, Catholic Charities expanded its original pregnancy and adoption services to include counseling, comprehensive information and referral, and others.

Today, with the ongoing support of Bishop Larry J. Kulick, Catholic Charities remains committed to its mission to provide help and create hope for those in need throughout the four county diocese.

Catholic Charities fulfills the church's role in the mission of charity to anyone in need by providing compassionate, competent and professional services that strengthen and support individuals, families and communities based on the value and dignity of human life.

# Message from the Director

Responding to calls for help, lending a listening ear, meeting the emotional and physical needs of our community members are all daily actions taken to provide help, hope and healing in the present and for the future of those we serve. We always keep God at our heart, the rights of every person in our mind and Catholic Charities' mission at the forefront.

This report illustrates the many services Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Greensburg has always provided, but with new approaches to meet people where they are in their lives and address the growing needs of our community's most vulnerable living throughout our fourcounty region of Armstrong, Fayette, Indiana and Westmoreland counties.

We are hearing from individuals and families who have never had to ask for financial help before, having felt the economic impact of increasing costs associated with meeting their daily basic needs. Our Information and Referral Department continues to support the ever-increasing needs for rent, utilities, clothing and food, by providing education and resources that stretch budgets further and lead to self-sufficiency.

We welcomed a new Director of Pro-Life Advocacy, and we partnered with the parish-led outreach Walking with Moms in Need, uplifting young or financially unstable mothers, parents and families choosing life for their child and reaching out for emotional and financial support in a time when less is being offered to encourage childbirth and growing families.

Although the leadership of our Counseling Department has changed, the commitment to offer remote counseling services while simultaneously reopening office doors for in-person services continues. Collaboration with the Diocesan Catholic schools with the goal of providing school counselors on-site for the benefit of students, families and administrators in the next school year is also taking shape.

In a time when so many continue to face frustration, sadness and difficult decisions as they rebuild their lives, Catholic Charities remains dedicated to meeting the physical, spiritual and behavioral needs of all those who call upon us for help. Thank you for growing with us, welcoming change, and supporting your Catholic Charities office. God calls us to serve those around us, and only together can we provide for the many faces in need.

# **Meeting Basic Needs**

Catholic Charities provides financial assistance for heating fuel, rent and utility bills; material assistance, including baby supplies and emergency food boxes; and gasoline gift cards for eligible clients needing gas to get to doctor appointments, work or school. Many clients shared that they were struggling to pay bills because of the high cost of heat, food and gasoline as well decreased work hours. Senior citizens and disabled adults often experienced financial difficulties because they are on fixed incomes.



**SUCCESS STORY:** Single mother Carla and her two teenage sons are one of many families helped by your donations. Carla contacted Catholic Charities about an electric termination notice. When her son was injured in an accident, she had to take an unpaid week off from work; when she returned, her employer cut her hours. Carla was in the process of looking for a second job, but she was unable to pay her electric bill.

Catholic Charities assisted Carla with her electric bill and an emergency food box and encouraged her to apply for SNAP benefits and visit a food pantry. Carla eventually found full-time employment, and her financial situation stabilized.

**DISASTER RELIEF:** In the town of Unity, Hempfield Township, Westmoreland County, more than 80 families were affected by flooding Aug. 5, 2022. Most were lower-income residents whose needs varied from complete loss of housing to appliance replacement and electrical repairs. Working with other local human service agencies and county government officials, Catholic Charities helped replace hot water tanks and furnaces, supporting 10 families at a cost of \$16,900. Of this amount, \$10,000 from Catholic Charities USA was used to purchase and install hot water tanks for seven families and a furnace for one family.

# Counseling

Catholic Charities' counseling services support our community through individual, couples and family counseling. In addition, we are working to establish these new services within our Diocesan schools.

With our offices in Indiana County (at St. Thomas More University Parish, Indiana) and Armstrong County (at St. Mary, Our Lady of Guadalupe Parish, Kittanning) reopening, and virtual counseling as an option, our services are even more accessible in our communities, where needs continue to grow.

Our counselors remain steadfast in their approach, welcoming all as Christ. Often an open heart and a listening ear are what is needed for one to find peace or lift the weight of burdens. This support can guide others toward more satisfying, happier lives.



67% of services are provided in-office; 33% are virtual



The **men's anger management support group** has been meeting weekly for more than 30 years, helping men recognize anger as a part of life and channel the energy it produces positively. Support and education are available for men and women.

#### Outpatient counseling

helps individuals, couples and families with a variety of difficulties, including depression, anxiety, grief, family conflict and anger issues.

## **Pro-Life Advocacy**

Pro-Life Advocacy is an outreach to the community to help educate and support individuals, schools, parishes and the Diocese of Greensburg at large on life issues.

Collaborating with the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Walking with Moms in Need initiative, outreach groups in our parishes help families and individuals with pregnancy and family concerns. Parish leaders share ideas and provide support to individuals, the Catholic Charities outreach ministries, and area Pregnancy Resource Centers.

The Pro-Life Advocacy department sponsored the participation of more than 400 students in Diocesan Catholic schools in an essay contest focusing on Respect Life Heroes.

Participation in Respect Life Month includes attending the Pennsylvania March for Life in October and the National March for Life in Washington, D.C., in January. More than100 people from the Diocese participated in these lifeaffirming marches this past year.

Support is also given to post-abortive men and women through Project Rachel.

The Pro-Life Advocacy Department is committed to prayer. We have joined parishes from the Diocese to pray at Planned Parenthood during 40 Days for Life. Prayer is our greatest weapon in preserving and supporting life issues. We pray the Rosary for Life and encourage others to pray with us through social media posts.

We invite all of you to join our efforts for life.

## Fundraisers

Each year Catholic Charities hosts four major fundraisers to raise funds for those in need across the four counties of the Diocese – Armstrong, Fayette, Indiana and Westmoreland. The annual Communities of Salt & Light Awards Dinner, Paul R. Smiy Memorial Golf Outing, Farm to Table Dinner, and Designer Purse Bash and Crystal Bake Sale collectively raised nearly \$147,000 in fiscal year 2022-23.





#### COMMUNITIES OF SALT & LIGHT AWARDS DINNER

Held in April, the dinner is the largest fundraiser to benefit Catholic Charities. In 2023 the Humanitarian award was presented to Gerald "Jerry" Wilcox, a parishioner of Our Lady of Grace Parish, Greensburg. The Kindness Closet at St. Edward Parish, Herminie, was awarded the Outstanding Human Service Award. Monsignor Raymond E. Riffle was honored with the Lifetime Achievement Award for his service to Catholic Charities and the Diocese of Greensburg. In 2023, the dinner raised \$107,757, which was distributed in the form of utility and heating fuel assistance, rent, food, and baby items to those calling upon us in their time of need.





#### PAUL R. SMIY MEMORIAL GOLF OUTING

Catholic Charities hosted its 21st annual golf outing at Ligonier Country Club. For the fourth year in a row, the event was a sell-out, attracting golfers from around the Diocese as well as our continued supporters from Maryland, South Carolina and Texas. The event features popular theme holes such as the "Pope-Putt," "Tee-rific Pierogies" and "Marvelous Meatballs," plus skill prizes, raffles and a meal where participants share in fellowship and stories from the course. The 2023 event raised \$29,583.



#### FARM TO TABLE DINNER



#### DESIGNER PURSE BASH AND CRYSTAL BAKE SALE

The sixth annual event was held at The Barn at Ligonier Valley and included lunch by Carson's Catering. The bake sale featured 125 delicious desserts plated on unique crystal and fine china. In addition to designer handbags, the event featured jewelry raffles, 50/50 and a custom-made grand prize cake. In 2022, the event raised \$9,626 for the programs and services offered by Catholic Charities.

### **DEVELOPMENT: 5 YEARS IN REVIEW**

Over the last five years, our three major fundraisers – the Communities of Salt and Light Awards Dinner, Paul R. Smiy Memorial Golf Outing and Purse Bash and Crystal Bake Sale – raised \$678,000, not including the year of the pandemic, in which the Heroes of Hope online campaign raised \$235,000. All money raised is given back in financial and material assistance to our less fortunate in the four counties of the Diocese. Through the generosity of individual donors and foundations, \$724,000 has been leveraged to support those in most need.
